Health Dep officials seeing **light at the end of the tunnel for omicron surge**
They are seeing encouraging signs that is **nearing its peak**, but
We are not quite out of the woods yet.
Although the omicron wave may still be far from over there was signs it is in
retreat.

COVID-19 cases and deaths are **declining in Philadelphia** and its **surrounding**
Will that continue? "It depends on how people behave, among other things."
Though case counts remain high, the number of new daily infections in
Philadelphia, its collar **counties**, and **South Jersey** all appear to have peaked
between **Jan. 9 and 12**

Since then, the average daily cases over the past week have dropped by more than
a **third in South Jersey**, by **40% in Philadelphia**, and by almost a **quarter in**
Delaware, Chester, Bucks, and Montgomery Counties. The declining case
trends in **Philadelphia mirror those in other northeastern cities**.
Still **thousands of cases a day on average**, which is more than we have seen a day
In **Philadelphia**, the seven-day average of new daily cases as of Tuesday was
1,979 — lower compared to more than **3,500 daily a week ago**

And while regionwide hospitalizations are down, **Philadelphia's 1,432 COVID-19**
positive hospital patients this week are **more than a week ago**. The positivity rate
in **Philadelphia** is currently **21%**, and health officials say a number that high
indicates the virus is transmitting beyond testing's capacity to capture the full
extent of its spread.

announced back in December, went into effect on **Jan. 3**. The city says it was
implemented in response ... to a sharp increase in COVID-19 cases in

Philadelphia. It includes a two-week grace period - ending on **Jan. 17** - where establishments may choose to accept a negative test from the last 24 hours in lieu of **proof of vaccination.**

Hepatitis A is a highly contagious, vaccine-preventable, liver infection caused by the **hepatitis A** virus (HAV) ranging in severity from mild infection lasting a few weeks to severe disease lasting several months. **Hepatitis A** usually spreads when a person unknowingly ingests the virus from objects, food, or drinks contaminated by small, undetected amounts of stool from an ... infected person. **Hepatitis A** can also spread from close personal contact with an infected person such as through sex or caring for someone who is ill."

Signs and symptoms of **hepatitis A** can include the following:

- Loss of appetite Abdominal discomfort
- Dark urine
- Joint pain
- Jaundice (yellowing of the skin or eyes).

Health Department's New COVID-19 Guidance for Schools: On January 19, 2022, the Health Department released updated COVID-19 guidance for schools. This guidance was developed using the latest CDC guidance on masks and isolation and quarantine, with a lens into the reality of schools in Philadelphia. The new guidance offers several changes from previous versions of school guidance.

- Students and staff still need to wear masks, but the Health Department is recommending that they wear surgical or N95/equivalents if possible.
- Isolation and quarantine for students can be shortened, if the school can implement certain mitigation strategies.
- Contact tracing should be reserved for higher-risk exposures, such as during lunch.
- The Health Department will no longer use case counts to recommend a pause to in-person learning.

Philadelphians Can Now Order Free COVID-19 At-home Tests from the Federal Government: The Biden Administration has fulfilled their goal of offering members of the public the opportunity to request four free rapid at-home COVID-19 tests delivered to their home. Residents are encouraged to visit covidtests.gov to order their free COVID-19 tests. National news outlets have noted scam websites with similar names have already popped up. Residents should be careful to only go to the official website.

In the last two weeks, **17.3 percent (28.8 percent- last week) of COVID-19 tests** in Philadelphia have come back **positive**.

Philadelphia is averaging **1,658 (3,301 new cases -last week)** of COVID-19 per day over the last two weeks

79 percent of Philadelphia adults are fully vaccinated, and more than **95 percent of** Philadelphia adults have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine.

5-11 years vaccinated are **33.1%** in Philadelphia

1,337 (1,621-last week) are hospitalized and 113 (126-last week) use ventilators in Philadelphia

Booster shots

Anyone 12 or older can get a booster dose after they've completed their COVID vaccine series.

To get a booster, you'll need to show your vaccine card or a photo of your vaccine card. If you've lost your card, **you can request a replacement.**

Philadelphia mask mandate

Philadelphia's **mask mandate** went into effect on **August 12, 2021** to combat the COVID-19 emergency in Philadelphia.

- **Masks will be required indoors at all Philadelphia businesses, institutions, and event venues.**
- Businesses, institutions, and event venues **that require vaccination** for all employees and patrons are **exempted from having a mask requirement.**
- Businesses, institutions, and event venues that **do not require everyone who enters to be vaccinated, must require everyone on site to wear a mask** except only:
 - **When actively eating and drinking while seated or at a standing table of no more than four people.**
 - **Anyone who is not seated or at a table may not eat and/or drink.**
- **If any individual is unvaccinated, everyone in the institution must be masked when the masked, unvaccinated person is present, no matter the reason the person is unvaccinated.**




6 ft distances, mask, wash hand, if sick stay home
